Care Pack for Scenes from 'Love and Information'

What is a care pack?

A care pack is designed to give you information to know if you will be affected by any of the themes covered throughout the show, and suggestions as to where to get help and resources. We will highlight potentially difficult subject matters and point you towards places of resource that will be able to help. We will also highlight any access information.

Please note there are plot spoilers throughout this document.

Access information

Scenes from 'Love and Information' is estimated to be 1 hour and 15 minutes long. There will be no interval.

Captions will be available throughout the performance on a caption screen. This will be hung from the lighting rigg on stage right.

Seats are unassigned, but the first two rows of the seating are wheelchair accessible so please make these available to anyone who may need them.

Gender neutral toilets are available outside the theatre, including a genderneutral accessible toilet.

The Garret Theatre is located on the fourth floor and is accessible via a lift and stairs.

Venue Information

Storyhouse is located in the centre of Chester – just next door to New Chester Market and Chester Cathedral – within easy reach from local transport hubs and just a short walk away from all city centre locations.

Our building is open for all, 7 days a week – and we pride ourselves on creating an accessible and welcoming hub for our local community to work, study, socialise and collaborate.

The performance will be located in the Garret Theatre on the fourth floor of the building.

The garret bar will be open to purchase refreshments.

Accessible Parking

As we are located in Chester City centre, we do not have a dedicated car park. The closest carpark is New Market Parking – 200 metres from the nearest exit. There is free on-street parking/car park for blue badge holders on Hamilton Place and Goss Street (4 hours max) – c.300 metres away.

Entrance

We have two entrances to the Storyhouse building located on Hunter Street. Our main entrance has ramp access and automatic doors that open by pressing a button

Wheelchair Access

The whole building, including the library, theatre, cinema and Garret, is accessible via lift, with wheelchair access to all areas.

Accessible Toilets

There are accessible toilets are available on every floor, with a Changing Places toilet on the ground floor. We also have gender-neutral toilets available across multiple levels.

Assistance Dogs

Assistance Dogs are welcome throughout the building and at all events. If you are bringing an assistance dog to a show, please contact the customer service team by phone (01244 409 113) or email (hello@storyhouse.com), to let us know and so we can make sure there is a suitable space for them.

Hearing Assistance

A hearing loop or sound enhancement headset is available in our performance spaces and cinema screenings in the building.

Captioned screenings and performances have a live transcription of the show's dialogue and lyrics, as well as a description of any sound effects and music in the play.

About Love and Information by Caryl Churchill

Age rating: 12+

In a fast-moving world flooded with facts, feelings, and fractured connections, *Scenes from 'Love and Information'* explores how we search for meaning in the chaos. Through a series of 44 short, sharp scenes, some just moments long, experience a kaleidoscope of human interactions that shift rapidly between humour, heartbreak, intimacy, and isolation.

From strangers to lovers, friends to family, the characters grapple with questions of knowledge, memory, technology, love, and truth. Love and Information reflects the fragmented nature of modern life while celebrating the enduring need for human connection.

The show is split into 7 sections and themes:

Section 1 - Obtaining information

Scenes: Secret, Census, Fan, Torture, Sleep, Remote.

Section 2 - Information people don't want

Scenes: Irrational, Affair, Mother, Fired, Message, Grass, Terminal.

Section 3 - Misinformation

Scenes: Schizophrenic, Dream, Recluse, God's Voice, The child who didn't know fear, Star.

Section 4 - Memory

Scenes: Wedding Video, Savant, Ex, Dinner, Flashback.

Section 5 - Information that troubles people

Scenes: Linguist, Maths, Sex, God, Shrink.

Section 6 - How information makes us feel

Scenes: The child who didn't know sorry, Climate, Censor, Wife, Decision, The child who didn't know pain, Earthquake.

Section 7 - Disconnect between information and what people feel from it Scenes: Chinese poetry, Grief, Fate, Virtual, Small Thing, Last Scene- Facts.

*Lines from piece 'Depression' will be played as a voice over between each section transition.

Production warnings

Flickering lights features in Section 2: Messaage Flashing lights High pitched noises

Content Warnings

Mild bad language, torture, mental health, death, climate emergency, radicalization, gaslighting, bodily harm, religion, alcohol, memory loss.

Mild bad language

features throughout

References to torture

features in Section 1: Torture

Example:

"He's wearing me out.
Take a break.
Do you want to go in?
I'll give him a cigarette.
He's not ready to talk" - Section 1: Torture

Mental health and trauma

features in Section 1: Torture. Section 2: Recluse, Schizophrenic. Section 4: Flashback. Section 5: Shrink

Examples:

"But you know when you take your medication that doesn't happen.

That's why I stopped because it was making it hard to get the information. You do know you're ill.

I've been told that" - Section 2: Schizophrenic

"It used to just be pain

the memories of what happened to you when you were a child and the things I wasn't letting myself remember of course" - Section 5: Shrink

"Breathe...just breathe...l've got you, it's all right

Thank you. Sorry. I keep seeing... I can see... I can't stop seeing...

I wish I could stop it for you.

Short of smashing in my skull.

They say time, you may be able to forget, even if it's a long time.

Once it's in there. Once you know that stuff" - Section 4: Flashback

Death, dying and grief

features in Section 2: Terminal. Section 6: Earthquake, Section 7: Grief. Section 6: Climate.

Examples:

"Doctor, one thing before I go. Can you tell me how long I've got?... Well let me say ten per cent of people with this condition are still alive after three years" - Section 2, Terminal

"Imagine being in it, imagine you're lying on your back and there's this wall a few inches above your face and you can't sit up even an inch and if you do it might come down on you. And the air running out, you keep trying to get a deep breath but you can't breathe deeply enough because very soon there's going to be no more oxygen. And if you were injured if you're in pain while all that's going on and where are your family are they dead or in agony and will anyone come to get you out and how many hours or days, I'm just so upset by it" - Section 6, Earthquake

"I've never had someone die...

He must have meant everything to you" - Section 7: Grief.

Climate Emergency

features in Section 6: Climate, Earthquake.

Example:

"I'm frightened for the children.

There were those emails those scientists, I can't remember the detail

no it didn't make any difference in the end

no I think you're right, most scientists all agree it's a catastrophe. The question is how bad a catastrophe.

It's whether they drown or starve or get killed in the fights for water.

I'd choose drowning" - Section 6: Climate

Radicalization and references to terrorism

features in Section 2: Message

Example:

"It's a message killing people yes because then they understand killing yourself they understand what you're telling them but they don't do they, they just because the deaths show how important it is no they just say you're a terrorist or and the terror is a message" - Section 2: Message

Gaslighting

features in Section 4: Dinner

Example:

"I did tell you
you didn't
I did I said Wednesday we're going to dinner with
but you didn't
yes because I remember because you said
all right I must have forgotten I'm sorry
yes you did
I'm sorry" - Section 4: Dinner

References to religion

features in Section 3: God's Voice. Section 5: God

Alcohol

features in Section 7: Fate, Section 6: Climate
Characters appear to be drinking alcohol in the scene.

References to blood and bodily harm

features in Section 6: The child who didn't know pain

Example:

"when I was a baby...I used to chew my fingers you mean chew?

and they got bandages put over or I'd chew them to the bone because you know how babies put everything in their mouth

I'd put myself in my mouth because it wasn't any different.

And if you fell down

I threw myself down

because it didn't hurt

jumped down a whole flight of stairs because that was a quick way

and you were all right broke both my legs and once when I went swimming there were rocks under the water and

when I came out my legs were pouring blood because I hadn't felt so you can't feel anything

emotions I feel feelings

but physical

not pain, no" - Section 6: The Boy who didn't know pain

References to memory loss

features in Section 4: Wedding Video

Example:

"because I wouldn't remember all this if without the video I wouldn't remember hardly anything at all about it because I can't remember anything about that day that's not on the video not clearly" - Section 4: Wedding Video
